## WILDLIFE AS CANON SEES IT

Say aloha to an icon. The 'i'iwi is recognized as a symbol of Hawai'i, and was once common on all the main islands of the archipelago. Now found primarily on Kaua'i and Hawai'i Island, the honeycreeper will fly long distances to find its favorite blooming flowers. An important pollinator, it uses its long, hooked bill to extract nectar from elaborately shaped

flowers. The 'i'wi defends territory during blooming peaks, but is powerless in the face of avian malaria, introduced predators and habitat degradation.
